¹ Exempt waste is defined as materials which are exempted from the definition of solid waste. Examples include construction and demolition debris, non-toxic foundry sand, and non-toxic fly ash and bottom ash.
² This figure should be calculated as the **net** total of solid waste disposed out-of-state. Waste that went through an out-of-state transfer station and was disposed in an out-of-state landfill should be adjusted to eliminate double counting.

- C *Drop-off programs for specific materials:* This is a program targeting a few material types, such as paint and paint-related materials; used oil; household batteries; lead-acid batteries; pesticides/herbicides. Waste may or may not be temporarily stored on site.

For some districts, it may be difficult to determine which category your program falls into. The following guidelines will help you make this determination:

- C If your program is advertised as a general HHW event with certain restrictions, then list it under the permanent or temporary collection categories (e.g., all HHW accepted except radioactives and explosives).
- C If your program lists the types of materials accepted at the collection site, list it under the drop-off program category. (e.g., the program accepts paints, solvents, and automotive fluids such as oil, antifreeze and transmission fluid.) Programs should only be identified in the drop-off category if the district can report total pounds collected in the previous year.
- C If your program refers the public to local recycling outlets for used oil, batteries, and the like, then list this program either under "HHW telephone assistance" if the information is given out over the phone, or "directory of drop-off sites" if the district has lists of outlets to hand out. If any of the local recycling outlets report total pounds collected for the year, then list the program under "drop-off programs".
- C Mark as many boxes as are applicable to your district for 1999. For example, if your district hosted temporary collection events, as well as a separate paint drop-off program, check both boxes in this table.
