

Ohio Leaders Support Beneficial Use of Toledo Harbor Dredge Material

Ohio EPA, Corps of Engineers Cooperation Will Keep Harbor Open to Commerce

Dredging to keep the Toledo Harbor and shipping channel at a depth that allows safe passage of the vessels that travel to us is critical. There has been a great deal of concern expressed regarding the practice of open lake disposal of lake dredging material; it is a concern I as mayor of the City of Toledo share. While the 401 water quality permit issued by the Ohio EPA will allow open lake disposal, it is noteworthy that for the first time this permit contains a requirement that the United States Army Corps of Engineers must work with local and state government to find alternatives to open lake dumping. We need to find a way to allow dredging but in a manner that has the least impact on our waterways.
